If you know of anyone whose membership has lapsed please ask them to contact the editor for a renewal form, which I will be delighted to send to them.


IMPORTANT DIARY DATE:

I have been very lucky and have come across a copy of the Parish Magazine from August 1948 which was a Special Issue as it was No. 500.

Here's a very interesting page from he magazine - with more to follow...

1907 — 1948 REDBOURN PARISH MAGAZINE

As the Vicar has mentioned in his letter the magazine was started by the Rev. G. A. Lewis Browne and unless there was an error in the numbering of the issues between No. 1 and No. 180 (the latter being the oldest copy which has come to light) the first issue appeared in January 1907. From the considerable collection of other Parish Magazines that I have it seems that most of them were started about the beginning of the century. From 1907 right up until 1944 Mrs. Miller acted as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer of the Magazine.

Until January 1944 the Magazine appeared in quarto size and contained only two pages of reading matter (apart from the inset); it now contains ten octavo pages of news, etc. The Magazine was first published at 1d., but in January 1934 it was increased to 2d. and in February 1944 it was found necessary to raise the price again. Even now it is only our advertisers that make it possible for us to produce it for 3d. per copy.

Our circulation in 1939 was 125; it is now 375—a fine achievement and we are indeed grateful to all distributors past and present who have worked so hard to increase the sales.

As editor since January 1947 I would like to say how very grateful I am to the various contributors who month by month help so much to make the Magazine interesting, and especially to express my gratitude to our Printers, Messrs. H. A. Richardson Ltd., for all their kindness and co-operation, and indeed for their great help when the 'copy' arrives late in the month, as it frequently does! B. Draper, Ed.

Redbourn Through The Centuries

For many years we have been privileged to hear lectures by Roy Craske about the centuries we have been covering since the inception of Redbourn Through The Centuries, a project which was the brainchild of Isobel Cranmer. Unfortunately Roy is unable to continue with his lectures but we are delighted that we have ben able to find someone to continue the lecture series. Kate Morris is a local historian, author and former Mayor of St. Albans who has generously agreed to tell us all about the 18th Century with as much reference to Redbourn as possible! Treasure!

Our curator Maria, is keen for us to acquire a medal which was found by someone who was metal detecting in a field on the far side of the by-pass.

It is a double-sided silver medal. One side of the medal is decorated by the left-facing, draped bust of King Charles I, moulded in relief. On the opposite side is a sketchy form of the Royal arms. A chain loop is located at the apex, with a single chain link still attached, with a second, smaller loop at the base. Two decorative lobes project from halfway down the right and left sides respectively.

Similar medals have been reported under the Treasure Act. One is in the Victoria and Albert Museum, dated to between c. 1640 and c. 1670. These medals were worn as tokens of allegiance to Charles I.

The medal may be worth as much as £1000 and we may have to apply for a grant to obtain this rare object:



You may remember this article appearing in the newsletter this time last year? We have now been told by The British Museum that it is ours!

Amazingly we 'got it' for the princely sum of £253.32.

We will let you know when it has been collected and is on display at the museum.
